Floridians Select Party Candidates On March 14

Like other Floridians, Jackson Countians will indicate their presidential preference at the polls on Tuesday, March 14.

Democrats will be asked to choose from 11 candidates: Shirley Chisholm, Vance Hartke, Hubert Humphrey, Henry Jackson, John Lindsay, Eugene McCarthy, George McGovern, Wilbur D. Mills, Edmund S. Muskie, George Wallace and Sam Yorty.

Republicans, who number only 55 in the six precincts of Northeast Jackson County, have only three candidates to consider: John M. Ashbrook, Paul N. McCloskey, Jr., and Richard Nixon.

In addition to picking a presidential candidate, voters also will be asked to vote for or against two amendments and to indicate their feelings on three straw ballot questions.

One of the amendments proposes a reorganization of Florida's court system. The other amendment would allow the state to sell bonds for a college-student loan program. The program would be financed by raising the tuitions of students who can afford to pay their way through college.

Guild Sponsors

Stew Supper

The Wesleyan Service Guild of Bascom Methodist Church will sponsor a brunswick stew supper on Saturday, March 11, at the old Bascom School.

Serving will begin at 5 p.m. Plates will cost \$1.50 each. Pints of stew may be purchased for \$1.

The three straw ballot questions are not bound to any pending state legislation. Instead, they will merely indicate how Floridians feel about three national issues.

The first straw ballot question asks "Do you favor an amendment to the U.S. Constitution that would prohibit forced busing and guarantee the right of each student to attend the appropriate public school nearest his home?"

The second straw ballot question asks "Do you favor providing an equal opportunity for quality education for all children regardless of race, creed, color or place of residence and oppose a return to a dual system of public schools?"

This is the question Gov. Reubin Askew insisted be placed on the ballot so Floridians can indicate clearly that they oppose busing (if they do), but that they do not oppose the integration of schools.

The third straw ballot question asks "Do you favor an amendment to the U. S. Constitution to allow prayer in the Public Schools?"

Jackson County's supervisor of elections, Mrs. Alyne Pitman, is presently accepting applications for absentee ballots.

She points out that 1,022 people failed to return their cards during the purge of registration books earlier this year. They will be ineligible to vote until they re-register.

Although the county lost more than a thousand former voters, it has gained 748 new 18 to 20-year-old registrations.

The county now has 14,477 registered voters, Mrs. Pitman said. Of these, 10,986 are white Democrats, 2951 are black Democrats, 401 are white Republicans, 46 are black Republicans, 88 are white Independents and five are black Independents.

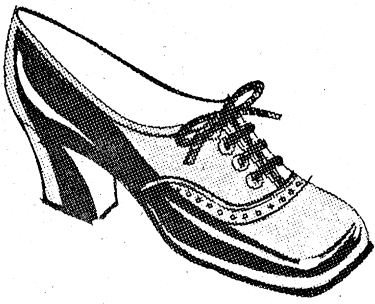

Although I am an enthusiastic bass fisherman, I am not much of a bass eater. Bass are much more tempting to me in the water than they are on the table.

Several years ago, a fishing partner and I experimented with different ways to prepare bass for human consumption. The first thing we learned was that bass are far more palatable skinned rather than scaled. Much of the disagreeable taste and odor of the fish is removed with the skin.

The next thing that we learned from our culinary research was that it is far easier to make a bass taste worse than it is to make him taste better. Our families were exposed to many mistakes (honey-covered bass with biscuits being the most notable) and two successes.

Our first mild triumph was barbecued bass. This tongue teaser is accomplished by simply barbecuing the fish as you would chicken or pork or beef. However, with bass, you might go a little heavier with lemon and onion than you normally would with other meats.

Our only other victory is described in the following recipe:

basses). Remove the skin and the entrails. Cut off the head and the tail (decapitate and dedrawersitate). Slice the fish in halves along the backbone.

Into an appropriate-sized cakepan, pour your favorite red wine -- after first taking a healthy swig to make sure that it isn't spoiled -- to a depth of about one inch. Add one-fourth cup of lemon juice and two tablespoons of barbecue sauce. Stir.

Heavily salt (onion salt is suggested) and pepper the fish halves and gently place in cakepan with the wine. Cover cakepan securely with a plastic wrap and store in the refrigerator for twenty-four hours.

When you are ready to cook, make a liquid-proof container of tinfoil for each piece of fish. Place fish and several large onion slices in the tinfoil containers. Pour wine-mix over fish and onion slices.

Close the tinfoil containers and wrap tightly. Put the fish in an oven, broiler, or smoker, on a barbecue grill or a charcoal grill (charcoal grill is suggested).

Let cook slowly for thirty minutes to one hour. If you have some juice-of-the-grape left over, you might give it another taste-test while the fish are cooking.

Serve with baked beans, hush puppies and cole slaw or potato salad.

If you don't enjoy this bass-delight, you probably didn't use enough wine. Try again.

That's the reel truth.

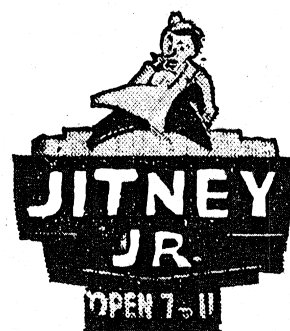
Sign-Up Period Ends Friday

Friday, March 10, is the last day that farmers may sign up for the 1972 feed grain, wheat and cotton programs.

Through Monday, March 6, approximately 900 farmers in Jackson County had signed up for participation in one or more of the set-aside programs, according to E. W. Granger, ASC county executive director.

"We've been recording about 50 sign-ups per day, but we expect that average to climb sharply during the last days of sign-up," Granger said. Total participation in Jackson County is expected to number about 1,150 farms.

The ASCS office in Marianna is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. Any farmer in the office before closing time will be allowed to sign-up, Granger said.

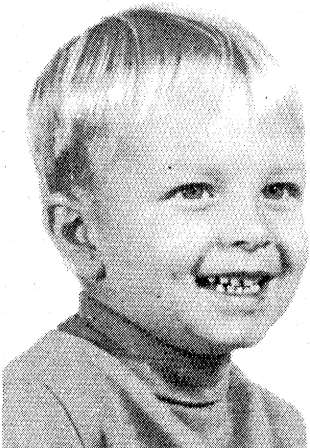
Keith McDonald Celebrates 4TH Birthday

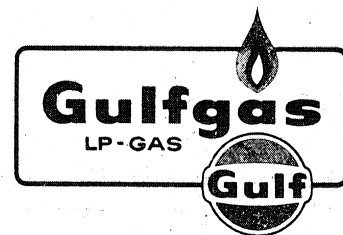
