

Notes for WINSON S. AKA (TINCE) JACOBS:

Winson (Tince's) ancestors were true Reservation Native Americans. ----- In the year of 1790 the United States Government begin taking US Census. The Cherokee Indian Agent also begin documenting names of people on Reservation number 96. In the North West tip of South Carolina encompassing 14 Counties was District 96, known as Indian land. Geographically it was here the Winson S. AKA Tince Jacobs blood line was first documented. The Indian Agent documented the names: Susannah, Benjaman, Burril, Jacob, Zack, John, Zachariah and Janco. All with the sur name Jacobs. Many of these names are still handed down in the Jacobs line today. Also in 1790 the official government Census taker recorded 5 Jacobs families located 150 miles East, Southeast of Indian Land in New Hanover County, North Carolina. These Jacobs families had migrated from the Reservation earlier. New Hanover is a Coastal County located on the Atlantic Ocean. Perhaps food supplies played a roll in their choice of this location. The Census taker documented the head of these family names as John, Primous, Zacheriah and (2) Mathews all Indians with sur name Jacobs. When the 1790 Census was taken, James Jacobs and his family was in transit from Indian Land to join them. They were not recorded in any of the

1790 census. He started a settlement in the joining County of Brunswick. The 1800 Census recorded James, Wife, son John and two other children. Census indicate John was born on the North Carolina side of the indianland reservation. James's brother Samual joined him before 1830. Samual was 15 years younger than James. The 1830 Census list Samual with a wife and 2 sons. Pryor to 1840 Samual relocated his family to Randolph County Georgia, had another son and died within the decade. The 1840 Randolph County Census list the family as: Son Richard age 23, Mother Mary age 44 and son James age 8. Between 1845 and 1860 Richard is well documented in Randolph County. Court and Land Records indicate 3 land transactions, A pay request from the County for constructing a bridge, a partition to have the voting place moved and a Court litigation. Note: James was Winson (Tince's) Great Great Great Grandfather, Samual was His Great Great Great Uncle.

In 1951 Tina Jacobs was the last child to be born to Tince Jacobs and Hetty Smith. The genealogy path taken begin with James Jacobs born in the North Carolina Cherokee Nation in 1785 and ended with Tina born In Jackson County Florida in 1951. Her great, great grandfather " Allison Jacobs " relocated his family of eight to north Jackson County in 1861. Records indicate he was a very successful 36 year old enterpreneur that came to the Bolton / Friendship area seeking great opportunities.

A tree branch will fall and the direct blood line will die with Tina. Her only male sibling produced no males to reflourish the family tree. The chain will be broken and the true Jacobs blood line will disintegrate with her.
